Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Shri Narendra Tidke Arts & Commerce College, Ramtek is the premier higher educational institute of the region. The college has the vision not only to cater higher education to the economically and socially backward students of this underdeveloped region but also to bring out the unexposed talents from them and to promote them as the global citizens through holistic education. Our vision is very much identical to the fundamental objective of NEP 2020. Moreover, our institution has established trend of imparting human values and ethics, maintaining the physical and mental well-being of the students through various in-campus activities and community engagement. Environmental education happens to be

	a compulsory part of curriculum of all UG programmes since the affiliating university has the provision of Environment Studies as a part of the syllabi for all second year UG students.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Our institution is affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur and we follow the norms laid down by the university pertaining to the award of degrees. Various decision making bodies of the universities have already started discussion on ABC and it seems to be implemented as soon as NEP 2020 is officially introduced.
3. Skill development:	We encourage students to pursue online skill based certificate courses run by IITs, NTEPL and SWAYAM. Under Prime Minister Skill Development Scheme, we have initiated ICT related courses life Fundamentals of Computer and Tally Accounting for students of B.A and B.Com. We have also arranged soft skills training programmes for our students every year. Hence, our students get equipped with technical and professional skills which improve their employability. To impart value-based education, we have introduced some certificate courses on Human Values, Professional Ethics and Women Empowerment. Apart from this, we conduct guest lectures, programmes and activities on constitutional values and awareness, human values, scientific temper, nonviolence and also a number of designated days are celebrated for grooming our students as sensible and responsible citizens.

Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Nevertheless, compulsory language subjects like English, and Marathi are prescribed to the students of all years B.A. and 1st year and 2nd year of B.Com. Response:

The curriculum is prescribed by the RTMNU (Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University Nagpur.

- Qualified faculty is appointed as per UGC guideline and the RTM Nagpur University.
- The HOD of the Departments hold meetings at the beginning of the academic year to decide the courses to be allotted to each teacher.
- The IQAC has inspired teachers to collect requisite material, download reference material, use appropriate teaching aids/audio/videos and PPTs to ensure good curriculum delivery.
- Lectures are conducted based on the timetable. The teachers prepare Teaching Plans for their respective subjects.
- The implementation of the Teaching Plan and the Activities of the Department is monitored by the HOD, IQAC and the Principal.
- Weak students are identified by taking class tests and are given remedial teaching. The good students are given additional references.
- The department arranges range of co-curricular activities to enrich the curriculum. Critical thinking and the progress of the students is maintained through the Aptitude test, class seminars, class discussions, quiz, and eco-friendly activities.

Good result is the primary objective of every teacher and the teachers are committed to their duty. We evaluate the students periodically based on their aptitude and abilities. After finishing everyunit or topic, teacher take an objective and subjective question answer exam to evaluate theirunderstanding about the concerned topic. Every semester we conduct probably two unit tests on therespective curriculum. The unit tests are designed carefully to evaluate the students and their knowledge. We evaluate students based on the given home assignment. Periodically we arrange classroom seminars which help them to get confidence which inturn remove the fear of facing a big audience. For continuous internal evaluation, regular objective and subjective tests are also planned in some departments. The questions were so designed to test the understanding, applicability and thinking ability of the student.

Apart from this, the principal of the college pays surprise visits to the classrooms to evaluate teachers' performance. The Principal received feedback time to time from students directly and discuss the issues in the meeting if necessary.
